WHAT IS THE 12/12 FESTIVAL

POPArt presents the 12/12 Live Arts Festival 2025: 12 short pieces, in 12 minutes each, each one in one of South Africa's 12 official languages. The festival aims to encourage creatives and live performing artists to create work in their mother tongue - or their favourite language - sharing this work with a curious audience.

The festival will be an excellent moment of exchange and experimentation with audiences, challenging our ability to understand and translate through story.

The 12 / 12 Live Arts Festival will take place at Joburg Theatre, Johannesburg from 17 April - 20 April 2025 in Johannesburg, with a new programme featuring 3 works each on every evening of the festival!




MOUTH SOUNDS | ENGLISH

HOME SWEET HOME | SISWATI

Home Sweet Home is a poignant story set in the dusty township of Emba Village, following siblings Sbusiso and Lungile as they return home for the holidays. Having built lives in the city, their visit forces them to confront painful memories, lingering guilt, and the stark contrast between their past and present. Encounters with old friends—Sthupha, now battling addiction; Zodwa, a young mother facing the realities of teen pregnancy; and Thulani, trapped in gangsterism—highlight the community's ongoing struggles. As the siblings grapple with feelings of nostalgia, privilege, and responsibility, the story explores the complexities of family, memory, and the enduring impact of one's environment. Ultimately, Home Sweet Home poses a powerful question: how do we honor our roots while forging ahead?



The play revolves around the story of the Mulatshawe clan, a family that was forcibly removed from their ancestral sacred land due to The Natives Land Act of 1913. Charles Kreik under Act 27, occupied a sacred site known as Zwifhoni found in Tshinwamukumbi where the Mulatshawe ancestors' spirits reside. This site holds great cultural and spiritual significance for this family , who have practiced their rituals and communicated with their ancestors there for generations. As the play unfolds, it becomes questionable whether the Kriek family's occupation of Tshinwamukumbi which they later change to DAVIESVILLE, has awakened the wrath of the Mulatshawe ancestors. As Under mysterious circumstances, the Kriek's began to perish and the has since been crime and dying of crops .

UMSANA NOMA UMDRAZANA? | ISINDEBELE

In an imagined and make-shift playground in a South African township, two children meet. Both at the margins of their expected gendered expression (a boy who plays with girls -femboy; a girl who plays with boys – tomboy), they come together in suspicion, curiosity, wonder, terror and childhood innocence to create a world of their own.

In a series of vignettes of song, dance, poetry, music and play, 'umsana noma umdrazana?' uses indigenous and contemporary isiNdebele childhood games, remixed and reimagined, to question and queer inherited notions of masculinity and femininity as they exist in the society we live in, through the lens of a child.



TLADIMOTHWANA | SETSWANA

In the heart of a small town in South Africa, Silent Storm unfolds in the cramped yet cozy kitchen of a modest home. As the sun rises and the morning chaos begins, Mpho and Tebogo, a young Setswana couple, are in the midst of a silent war. The remnants of last night's heated argument hangs heavily in the air. The play dances between humor and tension, as the couple's struggle to avoid confrontation turns into a series of miscommunications and realizations Their journey through the morning chaos slowly becomes a deeper conversation about love, expectations, and what it really means to take the next step in life together. By the time they leave the house, the couple finds themselves at a crossroads. Can they bridge the silence between them, or is the rift too wide to fix?

DEAF HEART POETRY | SASL

Deaf Heart Poetry explores the emotional and sensory experiences of individuals who feel disconnected from the world around them-both literally and figuratively. The title evokes a sense of silence, where the heart, though still capable of feeling, is unable to fully hear or understand the rhythm of life and the voices of others. This piece dives deep into themes of isolation, inner turmoil, and the yearning for connection. Through poignant imagery and poignant language, the poetry expresses the internal struggle of navigating a world that feels distant or muted, highlighting the desire for emotional romance and the search for belonging. It calls attention to the deafening silence of unspoken feelings and the weight of unexpressed emotion, ultimately portraying a journey of self-discovery, healing, and the hope for a deeper cojnr toon.



KA-GAZA | XITSONGA

Estavovo, an ambitious immigrant from Gaza in Mozambique, embarks on a journey to Johannesburg with dreams of wealth and greatness. He envisions building an empire, hoping to find work and create a new life in the bustling city. However, his dreams quickly turn to dust as he encounters the harsh reality of xenophobia. Despite his determination and resilience, the city's prejudice and hostility toward foreigners slowly erode his hope, leaving him stranded in a relentless struggle. As Estavovo's pursuit of a better life deepens, he becomes entangled in the destructive forces of discrimination, ultimately losing his life in a tragic battle against the very society he sought to conquer. His story serves as a poignant reminder of the silent, suffocating force of xenophobia and the high cost of dreams deferred.



ISIWULA | ISIZULU

Mapholoba, a former security guard, returns to his rural village of eMgababa in KwaZulu-Natal after a three-year absence. Having lost his job in Johannesburg due to company closure, Mapholoba conceals his misfortune and adopts the persona of a successful city man. Upon his arrival Mapholoba's fabricated image is put to the test, his return isn't met with the warm welcome he anticipated from his wife MaDlamini and his friend Zondi, leading to disappointment and revelations that shake his perception of home and relationships. As Mapholoba navigates the complexities of his relationships and the societal norms that govern his community, he must confront the consequences of his actions.
